



Personal Scrapbook Project

Part 1: Image Color Correction

Part 2: Image Retouching

Students will design a scrapbook in Photoshop using personal images from their own photo collections. B/W or color photographs can be used for this project. To begin the project go on an image hunt for photographs that portray the following characteristics.

Part 1: Photo Color Correction

Locate photos that have one or more of the characteristics below.

All images must be at least 5 x 7 (750 x 1050 pixels) in size and scanned or shot and adjusted to 150 dpi.

1. Image that is over or underexposed.
2. Image with no contrast or too much contrast.
3. Image with dark shadows.
4. Image with bright highlights
5. Image where you want to change the color of something in the photo.
6. Image with a color cast.

Part 2: Photo Retouching

Locate or shoot photos of the following:

All images must be at least 5 x 7 (750 x 1050 pixels) in size and scanned or shot and adjusted to 150-200 dpi.

1. Find a close up of a portrait in a magazine or book. (you will need to scan this in from a scanner)
2. Shoot a close up portrait of your own face with a digital camera. You will use Photoshop to change something about yourself.
3. Locate an antique photo that has been damaged or create a damaged photograph. You will use Photoshop to repair a damaged photo.
4. Locate a photo you would like to apply a custom filter to or use a painting effect on.

Turn in the following items for the final project:

- Students will create page layouts in Photoshop of each page in the scrapbook. Pages must include both "Original" photos and "Corrected" photos shown side-by-side for comparison.
- For grading purposes, each photo will be labeled to indicate whether it's "Original or Corrected",
- The layout work will be completed in Photoshop and output from Bridge to a final PDF.
- Students will design a custom cover and table of contents for their final scrapbook using Photoshop.
- Final scrapbooks must be created using the PDF book feature in Adobe Bridge.

Use the photography definitions to help locate the required images listed above.

Overexposure - overall photograph is too light

Underexposure - overall photograph is too dark

No Contrast - there is little difference between light and dark areas of a photograph, if all areas of a photograph are a middle gray the photograph is considered to have no contrast

Shadows - the detail in the dark area of a photograph are missing

Highlights - the detail in the light area of a photograph are missing

Color cast - a strong detection of a predominant color in the overall photograph

Close-up portrait - you will change something about yourself in this photo

Project 2-Personal Scrapbook is your second project in the class, it will last for 3 weeks of the class.

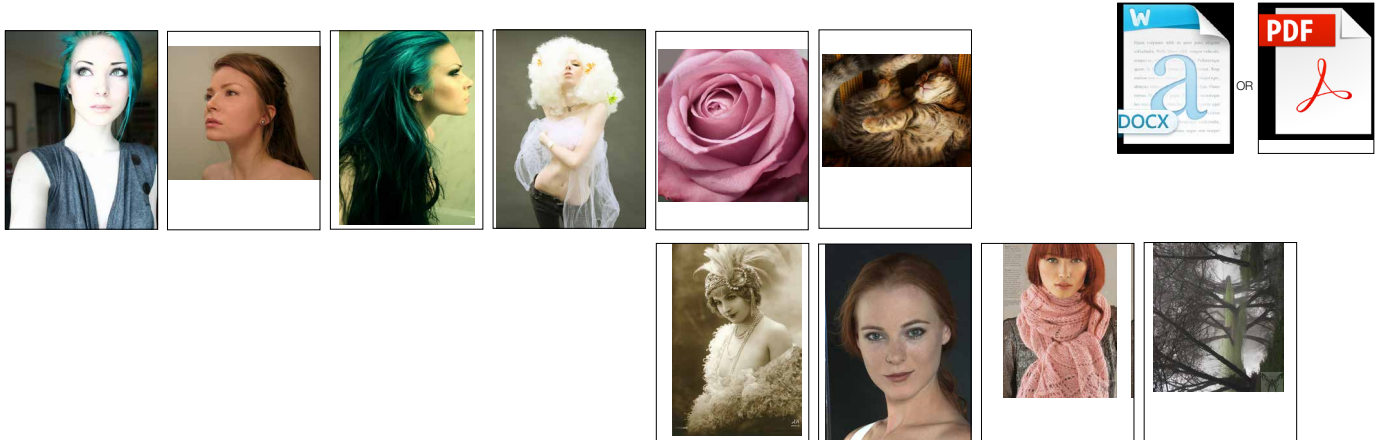
Each week you will complete a Progress Report detailing a portion of the project.
